

We gradually came back down to 30 to 25 to 20 and then things started to feel sluggish. The comfort zone is 20 to 25 wpm and that is what all of our goals should be.

I've been doing CW for over fifty years, the majority of which I was STUCK in the dead zone (12 to 15 wpm). This group got me out because guys like Mike liked to push the limits. Now we push each other. Ed joins in occasionally. Frank is an amazing CW operator, Toy really is an inspiration.

So nice to see the dark blue indicators in this display. Actually the difference between Mike's usual 100W signal and 5W signals today are not that different. Only a few dB only measured by ear on a QCX receiver.

It gives me a sense too to imagine how Mike hears me on the other side as I'm always only 5W output from the QCX into an inverted vee which is actually closer to a dipole, keeping those wires high in the air so as not to affect any wild buck that may cross through the area at night.
